

Biography

Richard Nadler is president of the Americas Majority Foundation. For twenty-five years he has been a policy analyst and opinion journalist.

In 1985, he served as researcher and writer for the National Advisory Commission on Adult Education in the US Department of Education, where he was a vigorous advocate for school choice. A co-founder (with Grover Norquist) of the American Shareholders Association, he authored “The Rise of Worker Capitalism” (Cato Institute, Nov. 1, 1999), and “The Influence of Intensity Factors on the Political Opinions of Investors” (Dean Witter Foundation, Jan. 12, 2001). Mr. Nadler co-authored “The Kyoto Protocol and U.S. Agriculture” (Heartland Institute, Oct. 1, 1998) and “Republican Issue Advertising in Black and Hispanic Population Areas: A Meta-Study of the 2002 Mid-Term Elections” (Access Communications Group, Feb. 2003).

In 2007, Americas Majority Foundation published four studies by Richard Nadler:

- After the Storm: How the American Electorate Views Conservative Issues in the Aftermath of the 2006 Midterm Elections
- Conservatives, Republicans and the African American Electorate: A Portrait of Black Opinion in the Aftermath of the 2006 Midterm Elections

- Immigration and the Wealth of States

Nadler is the author of political biographies on Sen. Phil Gramm and commentator Pat Buchanan, and a contributor to such publications as the *Wall Street Journal*, *New York Post*, *National Review*, *Policy Review*, *Insight Magazine*, *Education Reform News*, and *Human Life Review*. In 2005, he authored **Feticide and the Birth Cycle in Me’am Lo’ez**, under his synagogue name: Reuben-Lev ben Herschel. The work describes ancient Hebraic sources for the pro-life movement.

In 2006, he co-edited the **Daily Dispatch**, a military blog reporting every weekday on the war in Iraq.

Richard Nadler served as a regular panelist on *Ruckus*, a weekly program of political commentary and analysis on public television station KCPT-TV in Kansas City, 1998-2004.

Nadler founded the Missouri Taxpayers Watchdog Association, and served as its president from 1988-2000. He headed the 70/30 Committee (2000), the Republican Ideas Political Committee (2001), the Council for Better Government (2002), Americas Pac (2004), and Americas Majority (2005 through December, 2006.). In 2003, he served as political director of the Republican Leadership Coalition.

As a featured speaker, Rich has addressed GOPAC, CPAC, the Council for National Policy, the Family Research Council, Princeton Pro-Life Sunday, the Conservative Leadership Conference, and David Horowitz’s “Restoration Days”, as well as numerous gatherings of Americans for Tax Reform’s “Wednesday Meeting.” He has been called to give expert testimony on immigration before the United States Commission on Civil Rights.

Nadler has produced, written, and/or directed more than 150 TV and radio spots for conservative candidates and causes. Over the last three election cycles he has been responsible for the placement of roughly 20,000 spots targeting conservative messages to African Americans, 12,000 ads targeting conservative messages to Spanish-speakers, 8,000 ads on behalf of Iraqi War veterans, 5,000 ads advocating Personal Savings Accounts (social security reform), 3,000 ads critiquing “catastrophic Global Warming,” and 2,000 ads on behalf of Ward Connerly’s Michigan Civil Rights Initiative.

Nadler is the assistant B’al Koreh (Torah reader) at the Torah Learning Center of Overland Park Kansas, where he resides with his wife Barbara and their three cats.
